CONVERSION IS ONGOING

This Sunday we would normally celebrate the feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul, but because it fell on Sunday we do not celebrate it. However, the spirit of the feast is a reminder about our own work of conversion. Saint Paul was not merely converted once on the road to Damascus; he spent the rest of his life being converted. The blinding light knocked him from his horse, but it was years in the desert, beatings in prison, and daily dying to self that made him an apostle.

We modern Catholics deceive ourselves with a dangerous sentimentalism: we think conversion is a past event, an emotional decision made and finished. We were baptized, confirmed, perhaps had a retreat that moved us. Enough. But Saint Paul's entire ministry screams the opposite. "I die daily," he wrote, not "I died once." Every letter drips with the struggle of ongoing conversion.

This is a reality we all must face: many of us have stopped converting. We've plateaued at a comfortable Catholicism that demands little beyond Sunday obligation and seasonal piety. We've domesticated the faith that overturned empires. Saint Paul would have been appalled.

Real conversion is perpetual, painful, particular. It happens in this morning's resentment you refuse to nurse. In tonight's internet temptation you actually resist. In tomorrow's tedious duty you embrace without complaint. The Damascus road runs straight through your kitchen, your office, your secret thoughts.

The sacraments exist precisely because conversion never stops. Confession isn't for moral emergencies; it's for the weekly grind of becoming Christian. The Eucharist isn't a reward for holiness achieved; it's the medicine for the chronically unconverted.

Stop congratulating yourself on yesterday's conversion. Saint Paul asks you today: where are you still persecuting Christ? What false certainties must God strike from your hands? -Fr. Pablo

SUNDAY OF THE WORD OF GOD

This Sunday of the Word of God calls us to renew our love for Scripture. Not as mere historical text, but as living encounter with Jesus Christ. Saint Jerome, who gave us the Latin Vulgate, famously wrote: "Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ." His words ring true today: we cannot truly know our Lord if we neglect the written Word that reveals Him.

The Scriptures are not optional enrichment for the committed few, but essential nourishment for every baptized soul. In the Mass, Christ speaks to us through the scripture proclaimed before feeding us in the Eucharist: both are His presence, both demand our response.

We need a new commitment to daily Scripture reading, even just a few verses. Begin with the Gospels. Pray before reading, asking the Holy Spirit to illumine the sacred text. Reflect on how God's Word addresses your life today. Like Jerome laboring in his cave in Bethlehem, we dig deeply into Scripture, for there, in that holy ground, that we find the treasure that is Christ Himself.

"The word of God is living and active" (Hebrews 4:12). Open it. Read it. Live it.
